Lentopoly: It's Like Monopoly but for Lent!



This past Sunday, we kicked off our Family Faith Lenten series, **Lentopoly**! Lentopoly is like Monopoly, but instead of buying property, we will complete sacrifices and blessings for Lent.



Each Sunday through Lent, we will have a round of Lentopoly before Mass begins. Here is how it "rolls:"

Our large Lentopoly board will be on the sanctuary before Mass begins. On the board is an image of Fr. Paddy and one Fr. Alex, which will be used as the two playing pieces.



Each Sunday, two children will roll a die and help move the images of Fr. Alex and Fr. Paddy on the playing board. (One child for Fr. Alex, one for Fr. Paddy.)



Based on where Fr. Paddy and Fr.
Alex land, families are invited to
complete a task (a blessing or
sacrifice). For example, if Father
Paddy lands on "Complement a
family member three times in
one day" and Fr. Alex lands on
"Read the Bible for fifteen
minutes," families can complete
either one during the week. They are
also invited to share a picture of their
family completing their lenten
action.



Those "sticking to the rules" for the week will earn a heart sticker to place on the cross in the gathering space.

This past Sunday, the landed spots were "No whining or complaining for one day" and "Light a candle in church and pray for your siblings, cousins, or friends."



And we are already "hearing" about the great Lenten works of our families at play!







Missionary Co-Op



Every August, our parish participates in a collection for the **Missionary Cooperation Plan**. This past year, we collected for the **Congregation of the Sisters of St. John the Baptist, Philippine Vice-Province.** Sr. Maria Lourdes

S. Avila, CSSJB, Vice-Provincial Superior, reached out to our parish recently to extend a heartfelt thank you for the \$5,797 we raised to help their mission.

Their community runs four children's homes on three islands near the Philippines, serving poor and marginalized children, youth, and their families. The homes

provide residential and medical care to these impoverished and sick children as well as a formal education. At the same time, they provide non-formal education to the children's parents. They work with volunteer doctors and nurses who provide medical care and conduct outreach programs such as medical missions to villages and relief operations during natural disasters. As you can see by the smiling faces in these pictures, these sisters are doing the work of Jesus every day!




